

Building ideas

Nouns such as *concept*, *impact*, *issue*, *principle* and *problem* have been given various names, for example *shell nouns* or *carrier nouns*. They are important because they are flexible words that form the essential DNA of a text. You can learn to use these nouns to add information, to build ideas, to connect, summarize and bind a text together. A thorough knowledge of these words can help you read, write, speak and listen efficiently.
