

# Getting the right stress in English words

#### Introduction

If an English word has more than one syllable, then one of the syllables is usually spoken with more force, or strength, than the others. For example the stressed syllable may be made a little longer than the others. The pattern of stressed and unstressed syllables of a word is called its 'stress pattern'. This stress pattern is important for the recognition of a word. Here is how the *Macmillan Essential Dictionary* gives this information:

**computer** /kəmˈpjuːtə/ noun [C] ★★★ an electronic machine that has programs on it

The phonetic letters tell you the sounds, and the mark <sup>1</sup> tells you that the syllable after it is stressed. So you say the word *computer* with extra force on the second syllable.

What you need to know is:

- How many syllables there are in the word
- Which one of the syllables is stressed

These activities will help you practice this.
