other 2 LINGUISTICS two words that are correlative are often used together but not usually used next to each other. For example, 'either' and 'or' are correlative CONJUNCTIONS

correspond / kpri'spond / verb [1]

1 to be the same as something else, or very much like it: If their statements correspond, we'll have no trouble. +with The statistics do not correspond with our own ◆ +with The statistics do not correspond with our our experience. ◆ +to In 60% of the patients, all symptoms corresponded to what we expected. ◆ closely correspond This closely corresponds to the wording of the existing law. **1a.** used about something in a different country or system that is very much like something in yours: **roughly correspond** (=not be exactly the same) *His first* post was as an Associate Professor, which roughly corresponds to Lecturer here.

corresponding / kpri'spondin / adj [only before noun] ★★ 1 related to or connected with something. Investment in the railways will bring a corresponding improvement in services. • corresponding increase/decrease/ decline/fall Rising prosperity has not been matched by any corresponding decrease in crime.

2 similar to or the same as something = EQUIVALENT: Income from tourism is five per cent higher than in the corresponding period last year. ◆ Nurses smoke as much as corresponding groups in the general population.

correspondingly / kpri'spondinli / adv used for saying that one thing is related to another, or is caused by another: The service is better and correspondingly more

corroboree /kəˈrɒbəri/ noun [C] Australian an ABO-RIGINAL festival of singing and dancing

corrode /kəˈrəʊd/ verb 1 [I/T] CHEMISTRY if metal or another substance corrodes, or if something corrodes it, it is gradually destroyed by a chemical reaction: Acid rain poisons fish, destroys forests, and corrodes buildings. The metal structure is corroding badly and needs to be replaced. 2 [T] formal to make something weak by causing gradual damage: a society corroded by fear

corrosion /kəˈrəʊʒ(ə)n/ noun [U] CHEMISTRY damage caused to metal or stone when it is corroded: corrosionresistant metals

corrosive /ka'rausiv/ adj 1 CHEMISTRY a corrosive substance contains chemicals that can cause damage **2** *formal* causing gradual damage to something such as a society, an institution, or a relationship

corrugated /'kpra.gettid/ adj corrugated materials have been shaped into parallel folds: a corrugated iron roof ♦ corrugated cardboard

corrupt¹ /kəˈrʌpt/ adj ★

1 doing dishonest, illegal, or immoral things in order to gain money or power: corrupt politicians/officials/judges 1a. used about societies or systems: a brutal, corrupt, and violent dictatorship

2 COMPUTING corrupt computer programs or files are damaged and do not operate correctly

corrupt²/kə'rʌpt/verb [T] [often passive] 1 to encourage someone to start doing dishonest, illegal, or immoral things = LEAD ASTRAY: In his view, the people have been corrupted by their desire for wealth. 2 COMPUTING if computer and the start of the start o puter programs or files are corrupted, they have mistakes in them that prevent them from operating correctly **3** to damage or spoil something: *I feared that* my taste might have become corrupted.
